Dear Sisters and Brothers:

The Easter reports of the Gospels tell of confusion, fear and disappointment, as well as angelic messages and mysterious appearances. Tucked in among them, we find a post-Easter story of Peter - the disciple who was never going to deny Jesus — saying that he was going to go out fishing. He was joined by some of the others.

We aren't really told the reason for Peter's fishing trip, nor why the others decided to join him. Perhaps it was something as innocuous as needing to eat. The impression I have always had, however, upon reading this story is that, overwhelmed by the disappointment of Jesus death and confused by the empty tomb, they turned to something familiar to recover a sense of normalcy.

In this midst of this peculiar Easter season, when neither life nor worship has been 'normal', perhaps we can more easily understand the fear and confusion the disciples experienced than the angels' glad tidings that he is risen. There seems to be an upsurge, after a month of difficult restrictions and physical distancing measures, in the desire to 'go fishing' – to get 'back to normal'.

In the way the Gospel tells the tale, Peter and the others go out fishing all night but catch nothing. Their effort to return to 'normal' meets with failure. Perhaps they would have appreciated Bruce Cockburn's lyrics: 'The Trouble with Normal/Is it always gets worse.' They had, as of yet, not realised that life would not be again, for them, the same 'normal'.

As the story unfolds, Jesus appeared on the shore telling them to try one more time, casting their nets on the other side of the boat. They caught too many fish to the point where they were nearly overwhelmed. They make it to shore, however, suspecting that this mysterious figure on the beach was indeed Jesus. This identity is confirmed for them when they gather to eat with him.

Several of these Easter appearance stories in the Gospels take this eucharistic-like form where Jesus makes himself known in the breaking of bread. In this particular story, Jesus didn't just then immediately vanish. Instead he confronted Peter with the question of 'faith'.

Unlike what most people today would, however, understand by 'faith', what Peter was confronted with was the question: 'Do you love me?' Most contemporary Christians — and even most non-Christian contemporaries — would be most likely to understand questions of 'faith',

or 'belief', as doctrinal inquiries: "What do you believe about Jesus?' or 'What do you know about Jesus?'

Peter wasn't asked that. What Peter was faced with is: 'Do you love me?' It was framed this way because in the biblical writings, 'belief' wasn't 'belief about' but rather 'belief in'. Peter had already answered the question of what he believed, and what others were saying, about Jesus: 'You are the Messiah, the son of God.' Peter wasn't asked a theological or question. Jesus asked him a relational question.

There are still many controversial questions posed about those Easter events, just as there are about our sacramental experiences, but the fundamental question is still for us, as it was for Peter, a relational question. In the biblical writings, 'belief' was a matter of relationship. Biblical scholar Marcus Borg expressed it succinctly: 'Most simply, to believe meant to belove.'

However the risen Jesus comes to us — in word or sacrament or personal or fellowship or mystical experience - he still comes to us with this question: 'Do you love me?' A 'yes' answer means that we can't just go fishing again — that our 'normal' will never be the same 'normal', for we are now members of the community of the beloved.

Here are some other things to take note of:

The building will remain closed indefinitely, though phone calls will be answered during office hours. All gatherings, events or meetings must either be postponed or conducted by means of various internet tools.

The Food Cupboard will operate every second and

fourth Sunday of the month in its present modified format. No emergency food parcels will be distributed during this time.

Pastoral visitation is drastically restricted. In emergency situations please call the office or the Rectory. We realise that, despite the focus on this crisis and the cutting back on medical and social services, other things still go on – and some things get worse. Isolation is hard for many people for different reasons, not only physically, but relationally, emotionally and spiritually. We want to do what we can to help.

There is a new 'prayer chain' to supplement our ongoing prayers. Please call the office with potential requests. Remember to pray especially for leaders and for those who must engage in heroic forms of 'risky behaviours': medical personnel, emergency responders, those who deal with the dead and their families, those who keep vital services operating, and those mostly unseen people who enable these others to keep going.
