the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

PWRDF WILD RIDE FOR REFUGE

We will be doing a PWRDF Wild Ride walk for Refugee support on Saturday afternoon October 21, 2023. It is done in loving memory of long time deanery lay steward Dale Sparkes and our team name is "Thunder Bay-North Shore Sparkes".

We gather at St Michael's in the parish hall at 1:15 to start at 1:30 pm. You will get to meet St Michael's new incumbent Elizabeth Sipos. She will send us off with a blessing prayer to walk down Red River Road to Gathering Table. The distance is just under 4K and is mainly downhill toward the lake. We will stop briefly in the green space across from Waverly library to regroup.

Some people may want to start their walk from there which is 1K to Gathering Table but we need to detour a bit to get to Pearl Street and around some construction so we should stick together from the Waverly green space. At Gathering Table there will be refreshments and a time for visiting. Gathering Table was Dale's parish and his widow Sharon will be there. She is very excited and shared some of the planning with folks at St John's Schreiber and some of them want to come down to Thunder Bay for the walk.


